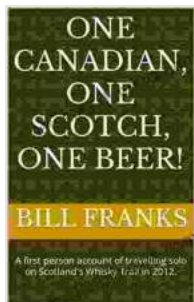

### **Day 5: Highland Adventure and a Whisky Masterclass**

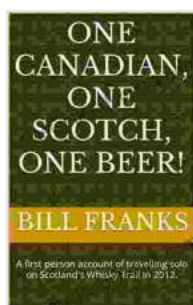

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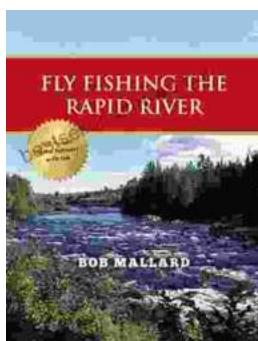
